

General Information

Knowledge Seekers Christian School (KSCS) is part of the Seventh-day Adventist school system, a global network of schools, and operates under the direct supervision of the Texas Conference Department of Education. The Texas Conference certifies that KSCS meets the standards set by the Adventist Accrediting Association and the Texas Education Agency. The Texas Private School Accreditation Commission (TEPSAC) recognizes this accreditation. The school's operations are at 1471 W. Corporate Drive, Lewisville, Texas 75067.

Financially, KSCS operations are underwritten by the Texas Conference of Seventh-day Adventists to assure consistent operations and additionally, by a Church who also subsidizes the school finances and operations to insure that every family has the option to provide their children a Christian education at a reasonable price.

<u>History</u>

KSCS is built on land that was originally donated by Henry Miller. Henry Miller and the Lewisville Seventh-day Adventist Church had a vision for providing all children with the opportunity to receive a quality Christian education, which supported the principles of the Seventh-day Adventist lifestyle. Since its inception, the School was called the Miller Adventist Christian School and, although the School's name has changed, our loyalty, appreciation, and dedication to the Miller family remains unchanged.

Through the blessings from God and the hard work and financial support of the Lewisville Seventh-day Adventist Church, KSCS originally opened its doors for students in the fall of 1992. KSCS started with one teacher and a shared-use classroom for grades one to eight. Currently, KSCS has expanded to have two certified teachers with plans of continued growth in the future.

Philosophy of Adventist Education

Scope

Seventh-day Adventist education includes developing academic excellence to the greatest potential of each student and nurturing students to become responsible adults.

Restoration

Holy Scripture places responsibility for the rearing and education of the child primarily on the parents. Accordingly, Knowledge Seekers Christian School seeks to assist the parent with this task. Our teachers work to bring a positive reinforcement of Christian values and a Biblically based view of life within the various subject areas. We strive to provide a structure for both rigorous education and moral principles.

<u>Wholistic</u> – To provide an education that emphasizes developing the physical, mental, social, and spiritual abilities as a preparation for living a positive, happy life on this earth as well as throughout eternity.

Admission Policies

Privilege of Enrollment

Enrollment at KSCS is a privilege. In order to safeguard the scholastic, spiritual, and moral atmosphere, the School reserves the right to refuse admittance and to dismiss any student whose presence is deemed detrimental.

Application Procedures

A formal application can be made by submitting an "Application for Admissions." Parents and students must sign a statement indicating they are acquainted with the school's policies as outlined in the handbook and that they will agree to comply. The school board will review all applications.

Academic Placement

Appropriate academic placement of the learner is a fundamental principal of education. The following factors are to be considered in grade or level placement.

- 1. Chronological age
- 2. Emotional, physical, and social development,
- 3. Scholastic achievement as determined by:
 - a. Standard achievement test scores
 - b. Teacher observation of the student's ability to reason
 - c. Teacher evaluation of academic progress
 - d. Prior school performance as evidenced by cumulative records, report cards, and conversation with personnel of the previous school attended. In the event that such documentation is unavailable, assessment tools will be administered to assist in placement

Grade placement may be re-evaluated based on the student's performance and testing, and by administrative recommendations with approval from the Texas Conference Office of Education.

Final authority as to placement is held by the KSCS Academic Committee, which includes the respective classroom teacher(s), a representative of the Texas Conference Office of Education, a representative of the KSCS Board, and the principal.

Exceptional Children

Knowledge Seekers Christian School is not equipped to provide the services needed for students with learning differences, Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder, Autism Spectrum Disorders and other situations requiring specialized attention. However, we are fully prepared to work with the local school district to secure services and personnel to assist in in meeting the needs of students with specialized needs at KSCS.

Admission Policies (cont'd.)

Non-Discrimination

Enrollment at KSCS is open to all who are in harmony with the philosophy and objectives of Christian education. Students who are willing to develop attitudes and spiritual values in keeping with the school philosophy are encouraged to apply.

Knowledge Seekers Christian School admits students of any race, color, national or ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the school. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, gender, national, or ethnic origin in the administration of its educational practices, admissions policy, financial assistance and loan programs, or other school-administered programs.

Admission Requirements

- Kindergarten students must be five (5) years of age on or before September 1. A copy of the student's birth certificate is required
- First grade students must be six (6) years of age on or before September 1. A copy of the student's birth certificate is required
- No child will be admitted whose account from a former school or previous school year has not been paid in full
- The registration, book and materials fee of \$395 must accompany the application
- A child who attends class before registering may stay the day, but cannot return the second day unless registration is complete and the fees are paid
- Within two weeks of enrollment, submission of official evidence of a physical examination by a physician is required for students in kindergarten, grade one, grade four, as well as all new students

Admission Policies (cont'd.)

Upon application, the following items must be submitted

- Records for immunization required by the state of Texas
- Physical Examination;
 - Medical examination is required for all new students and students enrolling in Kindergarten, first grade, and fourth grade
 - o Hearing and vision examination are required for Kindergarten, 1st and 3rd
 - TB skin test is required of all new students, and students that have been out of the country
 - Immunizations must meet Texas Minimum State Vaccine Requirements for Students Grades K-12 See pg. 22.
- Copy of the student's birth certificate as required by the state of Texas;
- Previous elementary records a copy of the new student's last report card or some valid indicator of the student's grade placement must accompany the application. If there is no grade placement indicator, a placement test will be given;
- Completion of all necessary forms:
 - Admissions Application Form
 - Student Physical Evaluation Form (health certificate)
 - Validated immunization record
 - Medication Permission Form
 - Continuing Consent to Treatment Form
 - Financial Agreement Form

Health & Physical

Illness

The school must be notified in the event your child is ill, especially if the child has a contagious condition, (mumps, chicken pox, measles, strep throat, pink eye, poison ivy, etc.) or a temperature above 100 degrees. If your child has a temperature above 100 degrees, he/she should remain home until they have had a normal temperature (98.6 degrees) for a 24-hour period.

Should a child become ill or injured at school, the child's parents will be notified and requested to pick up their child as soon as possible. If neither parent is available, the **emergency contact person** you have listed on the <u>Health and Medical Record Form</u> will be contacted. Health records for students are kept for each student in a secure location.

Medication at School

Self-administration of drugs, whether prescription or not, is not permitted on the school premises. Any student who is required to take medication prescribed by at physician during the regular school day may have medication administered by designated school personnel if the school receives a <u>written statement from the physician detailing the method, amount and time schedule by which such medication is to be taken</u>. Use the <u>Medication Permission Form</u> in the back of the handbook for this purpose.

Such medication must be delivered to the school office in the original container as delivered by the pharmacy to the parent or student. All medications must be kept and stored by the teacher or school office. No student is to carry any medication on the school premises.

CURRICULUM

"All learning opportunities, both formal and informal, planned and guided cooperatively by the home, school and the church."

It is the responsibility of everyone involved in the educational process to endeavor to make each aspect of the curriculum consistent with the goals of Christian education. The administrators and teachers of KSCS are dedicated to respect the uniqueness and worth of each student, and to utilize materials and methods that will be designed to promote the full potential of every learner.

The Kindergarten program is an essential part of your child's formal education. KSCS features "Stepping Stones" curriculum. This program provides a relaxed atmosphere in which each child has an opportunity to succeed and be creative, and is encouraged to develop to his/her full potential. Your child will benefit from individual guidance and shared experiences of the group as his/her personality and character develops. Special emphasis is placed on helping the child to develop socially by using problem solving techniques. Attendance Information

KSCS expects that each student be responsible for:

- Completing all required assignments on time and making up any assignments missed as a result of an absence
- Arriving at school between 8:00 a.m. and 8:15 a.m. in approved attire. Arriving after 8:15 a.m. will be counted as a tardy
- Keeping desk and shared workspace clean
- Properly caring for school supplied books and equipment
- Returning all sports equipment and supplies to designated storage space
- Assist in keeping the school facility clean and neat

KSCS requires that parents be responsible for:

- Arrange to have students at school between 8:00 a.m. and 8:15 a.m. and picked up by 3:15 p.m.
- Call the school by 8:00 a.m. when their child will be absent
- Assuring that your child's attendance (tardies and absences) complies with the Attendance Laws of the State of Texas
- Please note: Three tardies= One absence; and excessive tardies and/or absences may prevent your child from moving to the next grade level at the end of the School Year

Financial Information

Financial Policies

Before a student is enrolled, the parent or guardian must accept financial responsibility by signing the financial agreement on the application form. This signature indicates that the handbook has been read and understood.

The parent or guardian must pay in full when due all tuition fees, charges for supplies, and all other costs incurred while the student is enrolled at Knowledge Seekers Christian School.

Dress Standards

KSCS is a workplace for students as well as for teachers. Students should dress in a manner appropriate for a formal academic day. Therefore, students are expected to abide by these guidelines:

Boys Hair: Hair must be kept neat and cut so that it will be out of the eyes and off the collar at all times. "Fad" haircuts are not permitted. No hair coloring is allowed.

Attire for Boys:

Boys must wear the school uniform (see uniform list below)
No jewelry is allowed, including religious jewelry. The exception is bracelets/necklaces that identify medical conditions
Socks must be worn with shoes at all times
No flip-flops
No hats or caps are permitted
No tattoos

Attire for Girls:

All girls must wear the school uniform (see uniform0 list below)

Be modest. No short skirts, short shorts, spaghetti straps, tank tops, or crop tops Make-up must be used sparingly and **NO colored nail polish allowed**No jewelry is allowed, including religious jewelry. The exception is bracelets/necklaces that identify medical conditions

Socks must be worn with shoes at all times

No flip-flops

No hair coloring allowed

No tattoos

- <u>Shirts:</u> Mon-Thurs: Light Blue Polo style shirts long or short sleeved. Fridays and field trips: Knowledge Seekers Logo T-Shirt. Cold Weather: Knowledge Seekers Logo Sweatshirt or navy blue sweaters. Hoodies are not allowed in the classroom.
- Pants, Shorts, Skirts: Mon-Thurs: Uniform style navy blue slacks, skirts, jumpers, or skorts. Girls may wear black, blue, or white tights. No other colors allowed. Fridays: Modest, indigo blue, unadorned, high-rise blue jeans. No underwear should be seen. All clothing must fit properly and not be ripped or torn.

General Regulations

Teacher Notification

Please notify the school in person, by telephone, by text message, or in writing for any of the following reasons:

The student will be absent from school or tardy to school

The student should not go outside during free play or for Physical Education, for medical reasons

The student has a contagious disease, (mumps, chicken pox, measles, strep throat, pink eye, poison ivy, etc.) or a temperature above 100 degrees

The student is to go home in a carpool other than his own

The student is to leave with someone unknown to the teacher

The student is scheduled to leave school early for a doctor's appointment, etc.

Student Insurance

All students enrolled at KSCS or participating in KSCS school events must participate in supplemental group school insurance as selected by the Texas Conference (this insurance is a supplemental insurance, and becomes effective as a secondary insurance after the student's standard insurance). The fees for this insurance are paid at the time of registration. Each student is covered while at school and for up to one hour while traveling to and from school directly and without interruption and when on school sponsored activities.

If a parent chooses to have children, who are not registered KSCS students, attend school events, they must pay the supplemental insurance fee.

Children who have injury accidents while at school must report the accident immediately to their teachers. Injuries to children while going to or from school must be reported immediately to the principal's office.

A statement of insurance coverage is available to read in the office.

Pets

Pets are not allowed at school.

Unsupervised Play

Students are to have authorized adult supervision at all times while on the KSCS campus.

General Regulations (cont'd.)

Items that are not allowed:

- Alcohol, drugs or tobacco
- Weapons of any kind
- Radios or tapes, CD or MP3 players
- Electronic games
- Software or computer games
- Guns, swords, and toys that do not reflect the standards set by KSCS
- Money not used for school purposes on that day
- Skates, Skateboards, or "Heelys"

Cell phones are not permitted in the classroom unless the teacher gives special permission. If a student's cell phone is seen or heard during the school day, it will be immediately confiscated and returned at the discretion of the teacher and/or principal.

Personal Laptop Computers may be allowed to be brought to school at the discretion of the teacher and/or principal. Students must get permission before bringing a laptop to school and must agree to abide by the school internet user agreement. The school will not be responsible for incidental damage to student laptops.

<u>Food</u>

Each student must bring a lunch to school every day. Based on the Seventh-day Adventist philosophy on health, we suggest a balanced meal of protein, fruit & vegetables, natural fruit juices, and whole grains. We suggest that the lunches have minimal sugar content. Seventh-day Adventists advocate a vegetarian diet, but recognize that most people do consume meat. We ask that, in keeping with the Seventh-day Adventist belief in Biblically based clean foods (Leviticus 11; Deuteronomy 14) and overall good health, parents additionally refrain from sending:

- Any pork based products;
- Any shellfish products (including shrimp, lobster, crab, clam, oysters, mussels, etc);
- Any unclean fish products (including catfish, abalone, marlin, etc);
- Soft drinks or caffeine drinks (Tea, Coffee, Coke, Pepsi, Dr. Pepper, Mt. Dew etc).

To keep the facility clean, avoid sending drinks that stain (red punch, dark grape juice, etc.).

Weather

KSCS will only close for the most severe weather conditions. When the television or radio announces that **Lewisville Independent School District** has closed due to weather, KSCS will be closed. If you believe the travel conditions from where you live are hazardous, we encourage you to stay home. No student will be penalized academically for missing school on a day when travel conditions could have been reasonably deemed hazardous. The principal and School Board Chair may call for a 2 hour delay if the road conditions around the school are hazardous, even if the LISD has not issued a delay.

General Regulations (cont'd.)

Fire and Tornado Drills

KSCS will have a <u>fire drill, tornado drill, and intruder drill every month</u>. During the fire drills, all students will exit the school building and go to their designated area. The teachers will take roll to make sure all students are present and accounted for.

Guidelines for Student Discipline

The classroom teacher is the sole authority in the classroom and determines discipline for student behavior that is inappropriate. The next level of discipline is the principal. At the request of the principal, the student will meet with the discipline committee for consequences of unacceptable behavior. At the committee's or principal's discretion, the following actions may be taken:

A contract may be written and the student may be placed on probation if the contract is not honored

If probation is broken, the student may be expelled from school

Some offenses may be so serious that some or all of the above steps may be bypassed

The KSCS Discipline Committee consists of the principal, board chairperson, pastor, and the classroom teacher.

Inappropriate Behaviors

The following behaviors are considered to be inappropriate:

Dress Code – Failure to observe the school's dress code

Forgery – Using the signature or initials of a teacher or parent in a fraudulent manner

Copyright Infringement – Use of non-referenced copyrighted material

Verbal Abuse – Making statements that intimidate or injure another person

Cheating – Using dishonest methods to get a better score or grade

Classroom Disruption – Any activity, which disrupts the ability to teach, or the opportunity for other students to learn

Piracy – Unauthorized duplication of or possession of pirated copyrighted software, music or other materials electronic or otherwise

Dishonesty - Students are expected to always tell the whole truth.

Guidelines for Student Discipline (cont'd)

The following behaviors are considered serious and will result in significant disciplinary action, which could result in the student's expulsion:

Defiance of School Personnel – Refusal to comply with reasonable request of school personnel

Profanity and Obscene Behavior

Destruction or Defacement of Property

Fighting – Engaging in or threatening to engage in physical contact for the purpose of inflicting harm on another person

Theft – Taking or attempting to take property of another person or the schools Sexual Behavior – Engaging in physical contact or activities that have sexual overtones or explicit sexual acts; this includes sexual language and innuendo Bullying of any sort

Student Sexual Harassment

KSCS is committed to providing a school environment free from sexual harassment for all students. Incidents of harassment should be reported in accordance with the documented procedures so school authorities might take appropriate action. Students who sexually harass others are subject to discipline, which includes expulsion. Sexual harassment will not be tolerated.

Definition

Sexual harassment is unwelcome sexual advances or requests and other conduct of a sexual nature, which is offensive. It can be spoken, written, or physical behavior.

Reporting Procedures

Students who have experienced sexual harassment should report the incident to school authorities as soon as possible. If the harassment is between students, the student should report the incident to the classroom teacher. The student may also report to the principal. If the harassment comes from an adult, the student should report directly to the principal.

Compulsory Reporting of Child Abuse

The law of The State of Texas requires physicians, attorneys, teachers and other childcare professionals to report all cases of suspected child abuse to law enforcement. KSCS fully supports its teachers and staff in fulfilling their obligations to protect our students under this law.

Dispute Resolution

In even the best schools, parents and/or students sometimes have concerns regarding the school's operation or the actions of an employee, teacher or the principal. Most of the time these concerns can be explained or corrected by a calm, reasoned conversation between the parties involved. Please fill out a Legitimate Concern Form that is included in the Admission Packet to aid in the discussion. When direct conversation does not achieve the desired results, the principal and/or the school board chairman may be requested to assist in finding an equitable resolution to the concern.

In the event a satisfactory resolution is not achieved in the previous two steps, the patron is to describe the concern and impact in writing. This document will then be brought to the School Board Chairperson and a meeting will be called to understand the concern, the impact, and to evaluate options for resolution. The attendees to this meeting are the patron, any involved employee or teacher, the principal, the chairperson, and if available a representative of the Texas Conference Education Leadership. Forms for requesting this meeting are available from the school office (principal, assistant or board chair.)

If the previous steps have been exhausted, a patron can request a confidential session of the School Board to hear the concern, the impact, and the desired resolution. The board members will fully clarify all points and adjourn to an executive session where they will discuss each position and prayerfully evaluate the options for resolution. Once a decision has been made by the board, the resolution will be communicated verbally and in writing with the patron. The decision at this point will be considered final.

Matthew 18:15-20

Physicion illness may be documented with a written statement from a physician, school nurse, or the child; and, or the child; and containing wording such as: "This is to verify that (name of student) had varicella disease (chickenpox) on or about (data) and does not need varicella vaccine." This written statement will be acceptable in place of any and all varicella vaccine does required.
